EVENT SHOWING OFF

The **Guerrilla Truck Show** has been the summer's hippest design event ever since Morlen Sinoway started it outside the doors of his Fulton Market shop in 2004. And it has just gotten better—and bigger—ever since. Two years ago, a group of about 15 furniture makers and other independent designers called **Object Society** (many of them Guerrilla alums) decided to expand on the concept. "We all loved the bohemian aspect," says Michael Dreeben (dreeben.com), who founded the group with Michael Koehler (koehlerdesignbuild.com). So in 2009, they held a similarly spirited exhibit at a gallery in River North, concurrent with the Truck Show, which attracted about 150 guests. Last year, they found a space near Fulton and drew some 500 people, including scouts from CB2, who tapped member Jonas Wahlstrom to put a table and lounge chair he showed into mass production. At presstime, they had not settled on a location for this year's event ("We're a little fly-by-the-seat-of-our-pants," says Dreeben), but one thing's for sure—it won't be too far from a fleet of very sweetly appointed trucks.
